

1. Three-Act Structure

Yes, Good Will Hunting follows a discernible three-act structure.

- **Act 1: Inciting Incident** - Will solves a complex math problem on a chalkboard in MIT's classroom (Page 4). This marks the inciting incident, where Will's latent genius is revealed.
- **Plot Point 1** - Will is arrested after getting into a fight (Page ~11). This event propels him into a new world of therapy and mentorship with Professor Lambeau and Sean.
